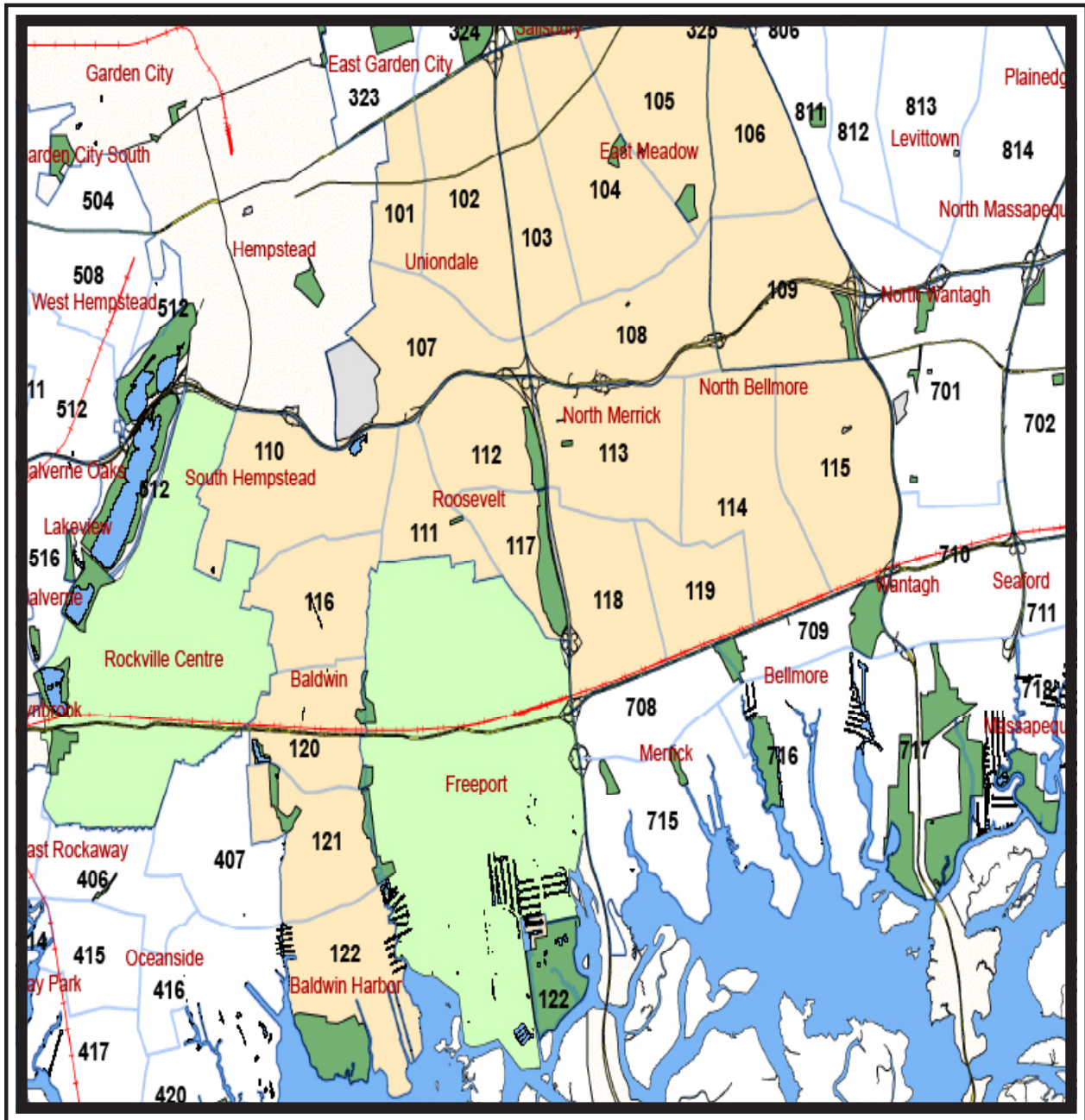

FIRST PRECINCT POP SUCCESS STORY

The First Precinct attended a Baldwin Oaks Civic Association meeting in November. Attendees expressed concern about possible squatters at a Baldwin residence. The complaint stated that originally an elderly man lived at the location with his mentally disabled daughter. The man became ill and was hospitalized. After that, the house was vacant for a while until a group of people moved in.

Utilizing the scanning, analysis, response and assessment (SARA) model, the POP team began the scanning phase, and visited the location. Upon arrival, officers observed that the house appeared to be occupied. Then, continuing on with the analysis process, officers ran the license plates of the vehicles in the driveway and in front of the house. The addresses of the registrations did not match the home address. Officers began a canvass and spoke to several neighbors on the block. They said that the new people moved into the house two weeks ago, and one neighbor supplied the police with a phone number for an attorney who was handling matters for the residence owner. POP contacted the attorney and asked about the house's status. Officers were advised by the attorney that the homeowner passed away a few months earlier and his daughter had been placed in a facility. The law guardian stated that the house should be vacant. The attorney was told that the house appeared to be occupied and an officer would get back to her after further investigation. A response was then initiated and the house was revisited. Officers spoke to several occupants of the house who said they rented it from the homeowner and had been living there for several months. They produced a generic lease, which appeared to be signed by the homeowner. When questioned, each of the occupants gave different descriptions of the person they claimed to have rented the house from. The law guardian was notified of the situation, and she again stated that the house should be vacant and anyone living there should be arrested. The occupants insisted that they were living in the house legally. The guardian agreed to sign a Form 32b, requesting an arrest for trespassers. Another Form 32b was also secured from a neighbor, who again stated that the new occupants were only at the house for approximately two weeks. The occupants refused to exit the premise. Consequently, two subjects were placed under arrest for trespassing and possession of a forged instrument. Other occupants of the house, who were not directly involved, gathered their belongings and left. The law guardian contacted a locksmith who secured the home with new locks.

In the final assessment, the squatter situation was resolved by removing the occupants. The guardian was advised to be more vigilant about monitoring the house in the future. Along with the neighbors, POP will continue to check on the house periodically.

Representatives from the civic association complained about "Cars 4 Cash" signs that have appeared in multiple locations throughout Uniondale. The people who are placing the signs were advised to stop placing the signs on public property, and POP is currently working with the Town of Hempstead (TOH) regarding this matter. At this time, all known signs have been removed. Gangs and gang violence was also discussed. Following a meeting with the Uniondale superintendent of schools, it was decided that a proactive approach would be best. Therefore, the school staff and parents will be trained in gang recognition. The First Precinct pledged its continued support with the school resource officers (SRO)'s and continued intensive patrol (IP) of the school grounds and the surrounding area.

October 4, 2016 at 1930 Hours: Community Meeting, Forest City Clubhouse

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer John Bilello

The president of the association wanted to know what resources the county has available for the Heroin epidemic in the community. Officer Bilello informed the group that there is a Narcan Program that the Nassau County Executive's Office runs, which educates the public and supplies Narcan. Additionally, club members said there are solicitors in the neighborhood going door to door selling candy, and home security sales people are knocking on doors as well. The association was instructed to call 911 when this occurs and a police officer will take care of it.

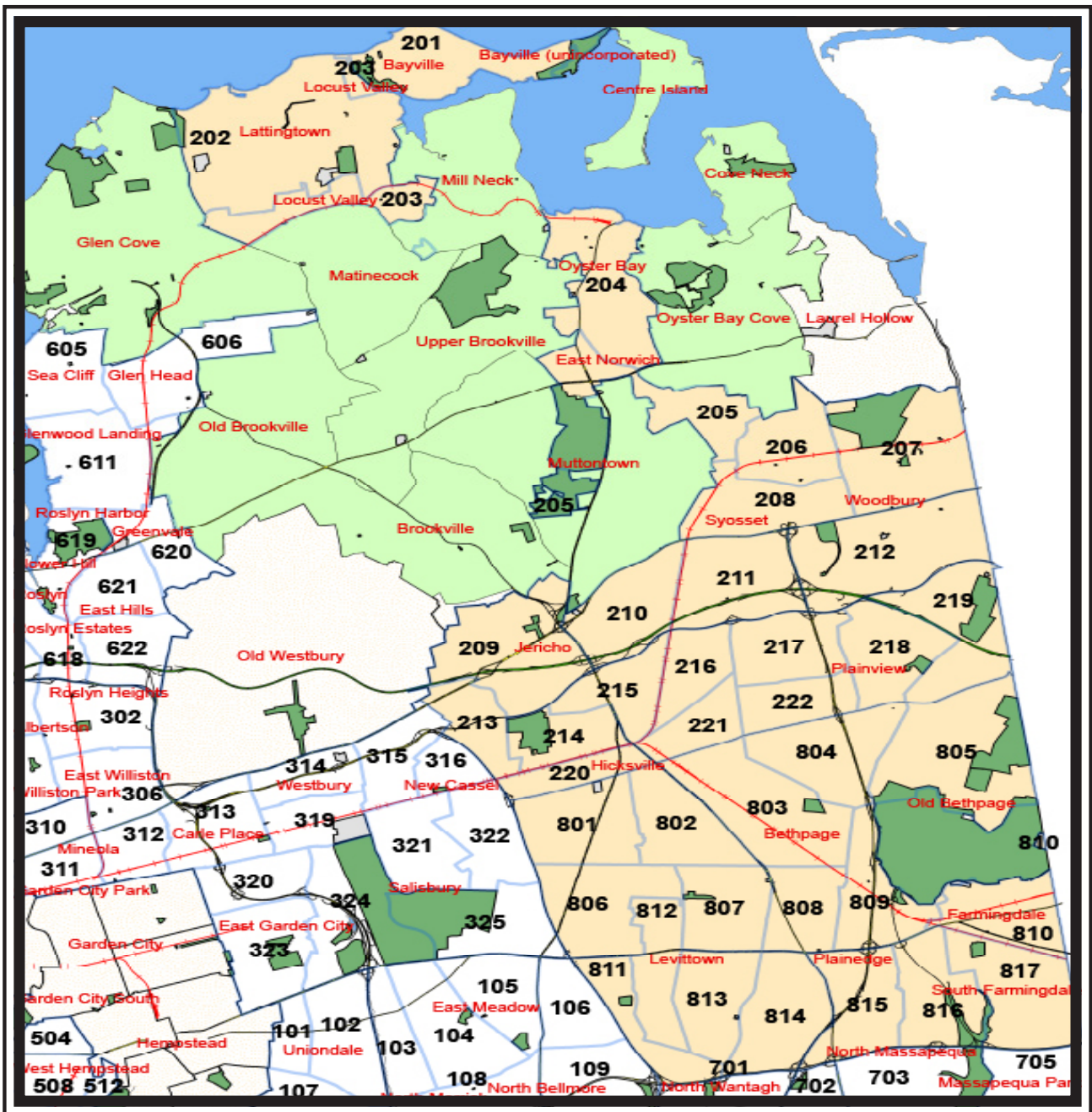

SECOND PRECINCT POP (NORTH) SUCCESS STORY

Two separate issues that took place within the confines of the Second Precinct were solved by POP Officers. Several complaints were received from local businesses owners, Town of Oyster Bay Code Enforcement and local politicians in the Hicksville area regarding Halal food carts. The basis of these complaints were loss of business to local food merchants, traffic related issues when the food cart is in operation and violation of town ordinances.

The investigation began with a meeting with the Town of Oyster Bay Code Enforcement officials at the location of the complaint. During the meeting, the problems were identified. The workers were told that even though they had a town permit, they were violating traffic rules and ordinances. The goal was to educate the workers about the rules in order to achieve compliance.

During a period of observation of these carts in operation, it was revealed that the Halal cart workers failed to comply with the traffic and town ordinances, as discussed. As a result, multiple appearance tickets were issued and one person was arrested. Multiple traffic tickets were also issued.

After meeting with the town attorney regarding this issue, the town attorney then met with the owners of the Halal carts. An agreement was made to extend their permit until February 2017, with the understanding that the owners would be in strict compliance of the traffic laws and ordinances. They will be operating out of a store front after that period and will no longer be on the street. Since the agreement, there have been no further incidents. POP officers will continue to monitor the situation.

SECOND PRECINCT POP (SOUTH) SUCCESS STORY

The second problem in the confines of the Second Precinct involved a homeless individual. A Bethpage-based complainant stated that a homeless individual is trespassing overnight in his buildings. The subject uses a space heater, and the complainant is very concerned about a possible fire.

The subject was identified. He had prior arrests for petit larceny and trespassing. He does not want any assistance from the police department. The subject stays in the vestibules of medical buildings with the space heater.

The POP Unit had a conference call with the owners of the medical buildings. The building owners gave consent to their security guards to sign a Form 32b, requesting the arrest of the subject if he trespasses again. The form is on file with the precinct. POP officers acted as the liaisons between the building owners and the department. POP also had a meeting with the Long Island Coalition for the Homeless. They provided details of the Second Precinct's homeless problems, including the names and locations of known individuals. The coalition said they would attempt to make contact with the individuals.

The subject was arrested on November 7th and December 21st for trespassing at the problem location. The coalition made contact with the subject and offered him assistance. The subject has not been seen trespassing since his last arrest. POP will continue to monitor the situation.

A quarterly safety meeting was held. There were no issues involving the police department. The district is conducting traffic surveys for the Abbey Lane and Gardiner's Avenue schools to see if they can alleviate traffic problems during student drop off and pick up times.

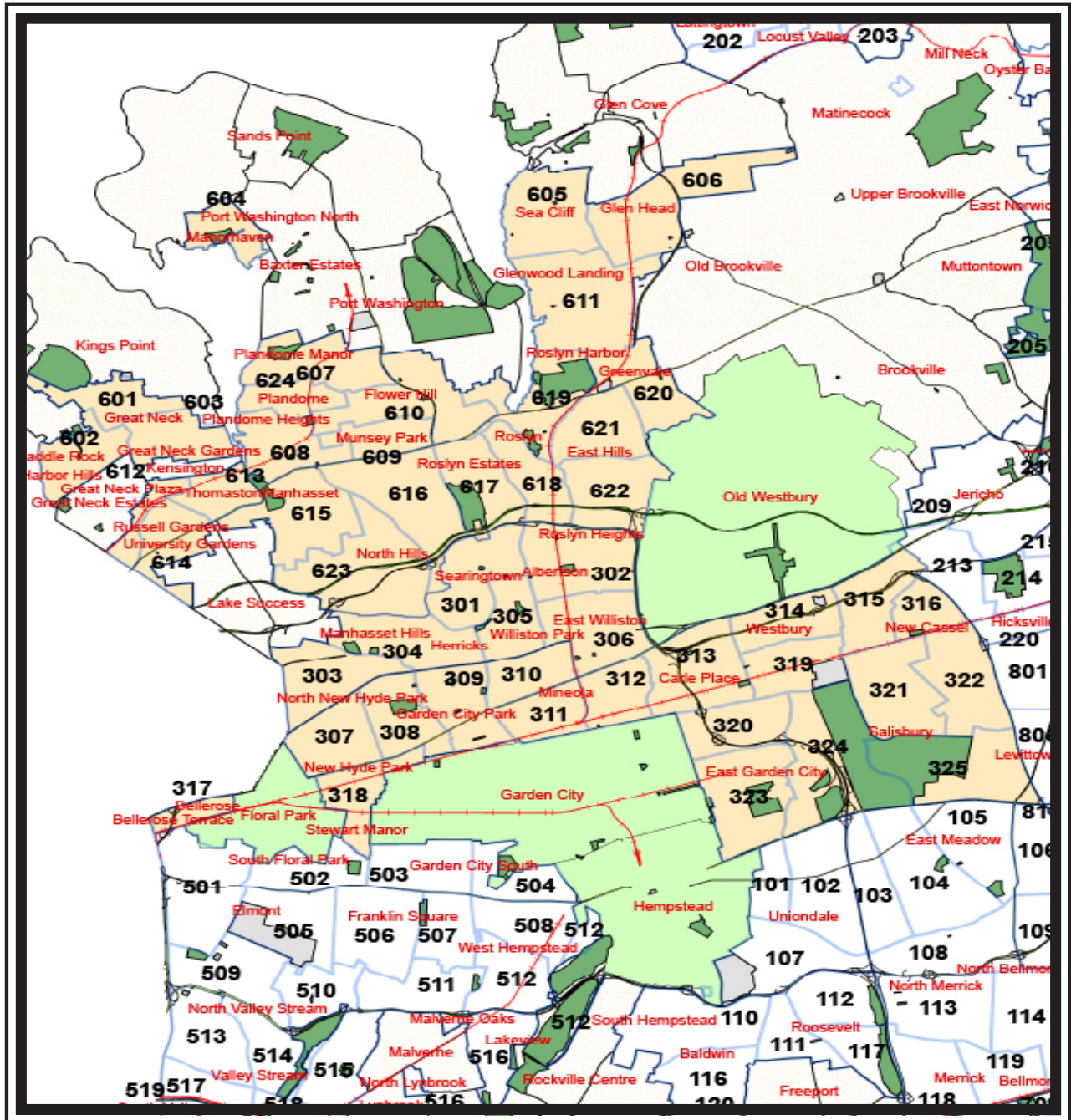

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THIRD PRECINCT (NORTH) POP SUCCESS STORY

Numerous complaints and 911 calls were received at the start of the school year from residents of the Manorhaven School District. A representative from the Pierce Coach Line bus company also called the unit directly, stating that there were ongoing problems at certain bus stops in the district since parents were insisting that the children should be dropped off at different places instead of the designated bus stops. School transportation, security and administration were unable to solve the problem, which was becoming confrontational and potentially violent. POP immediately contacted all parties involved, came up with the root cause of the problem and determined a corrective action.

It was determined upon investigation that the bus driver was the root cause of the problem. On occasion, he changed the drop-off and pick-up locations of the children. Then the parents demanded that the children be dropped off at locations they felt were better choices. When the driver started refusing, the parents became irate. The officer was able to have all parties involved agree that the safety of the children was paramount. For safety and the expediency of pickups and drop offs, it was decided that there would be one dedicated stop for the children from now on. The only change would be if a child with special needs required a different drop off point. Parents, school transportation authority and the bus driver all agreed to the terms.

The following day, the POP officer followed the school bus on its route and watched the pickup of the children. The bus driver collected the children at the designated spot. After the pickup, the officer spoke with a few of the parents and they were happy with the outcome. They felt the stop for the kids was the safest and agreed that it seemed to be working. The officer stayed in contact with the parents, school transportation and post car to ensure there are no additional issues. At this time, the problem has been rectified.



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THIRD PRECINCT (SOUTH) POP SUCCESS STORY

There were reported incidents of children being approached by strangers in the New Hyde Park and Garden City Park areas. On November 10th, a 12-year-old complainant stated that three adult males tried to lure her into a grey pickup truck. Subject #1 and subject #2 remained in the vehicle, while subject #3 walked behind her. The two unknown suspects in the truck attempted to lure the victim into the truck by stating: "We want to take you somewhere nice." The victim then spotted a fourth subject, which the victim stated was her mother, by calling out to her. She wasn't actually the victim's mother. When the victim did this, subject #3, who was walking behind the victim, stopped following her and got into the pickup truck. All three unknown suspects drove off. The complainant's parents notified the police approximately two hours after the incident occurred.

Since September of 2016, there have been three minors approached by suspicious individuals including the incident above in the New Hyde Park area. All three incidents were similar in that the minors were by themselves. One minor was walking home, a second minor was walking to the bus stop and the third was running for track practice. Fortunately, no one was hurt or abducted in these cases.

Patrol cars and post operators were immediately notified to intensive patrol (IP) the areas near the schools where the incidents occurred. POP officers also spoke with post car operators and discussed school arrival and dismissal times. Officers also met with the school district superintendent, as well as with the New Hyde Park High School principal and three elementary school principals to address their concerns. POP Officer Cooper conducted IP for several days in the areas where the minor was approached. Officer Cooper did stop a grey truck with an operator matching the description of one of the above subjects. The driver presented school identification and stated that he was a janitor for the New Hyde Park High School, which Officer Cooper verified by speaking with the assistant principal. Police Officer Cooper also attended a group PTA meeting to explain the role of POP and to address parent's concerns. He handed out NCPD Stranger Danger safety pamphlets to the superintendent and PTA Leadership for distribution to the parents. In order to promote safety and to increase awareness about strangers among the children in the schools, Officers Atkin and Cooper initiated Stranger Danger presentations to children in four different elementary schools in the New Hyde Park, Garden City Park areas (exceeding 1,200 children). Each



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presentation was approximately 20 minutes in length and the information was based on the NCPD Stranger Danger pamphlet. After each presentation, children were encouraged to ask questions and they were given a “Police Are Your Friend” coloring book. Officers Atkin and Cooper also initiated a “Park, Walk & Talk” style of VTL activity during dismissal times at each of the schools. The purpose of this activity was to increase police presence at critical times when children may be most vulnerable to strangers, to enforce VTLs to promote safety for everyone entering and exiting the school zone, and to speak with crossing guards and school safety officers about repeat VTL offenders. It was also a way to interact with parents and obtain information about any suspicious activity.

At this time, there have been no further reported incidents of children being approached by strangers in the New Hyde Park and Garden City Park School Districts. Previous and ongoing efforts to conduct enforcement by POP during drop off and dismissal times have greatly increased safety in and around the schools. Stranger danger talks, which are ongoing, have educated children about awareness of strangers and how to prevent any future incidents. Meetings with school officials are ongoing as well. Communications between the POP Unit and the community and school has strengthened as a result of the incidents, which will help to combat any future issues that may arise.

October 5, 2016 at 1016 Hours: Mineola High School

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

School officials met with the police officers to get an update on how the school year was progressing and to discuss scary clown rumors. Although there were no actual clown sightings, and case reports were taken from the principals at both New Hyde Park Memorial High School and the Herricks High School, Police Officer Atkin said there were Instagram messages about clowns visiting the schools. Officer Cooper confirmed the Third Precinct Community Forum on October 20th, which is awaiting approval from the superintendent to use the auditorium. Officers will continue to IP the school and maintain an open dialogue with the students.

October 11, 2016 at 0730 Hours: Saddle Rock Elementary School

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Christian Moy

School officials notified the police department concerning an Instagram account that had posted pictures of the school and threats. Post cars were notified to regularly patrol the schools listed and POP officers were enlisted as well. A case report was generated, AFILDC was notified and SIS is investigating. POP contact information was left for any future concerns.

October 11, 2016 at 1000 Hours: Great Neck North Middle School

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Christian Moy

A meeting was arranged with the principal who was the direct recipient of an Instagram account with school threats by clowns. A report was generated, AFLIDC was notified and SIS is investigating. Patrol cars were notified to patrol the school area regularly, supplemented by POP and POP contact information was left for any future concerns.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 13, 2016 at 1900 Hours: CASA, Plandome Heights Civic Association and the Hispanic United Association, Third Precinct

Department Members in Attendance: Inspector John Berry, Police Officer Todd Atkin, Police Officer Jesse Cooper and Police Officer Christian Moy

Inspector Berry reviewed crime statics, touching on cell phone crime patterns, robberies and stolen vehicles. Rooftop burglaries increased dramatically but an arrest was made and numerous cases will be closed as a result of the arrest. Large house parties were a main focus over the summer and the police department was successful in preventing some of the parties from occurring. Police Officer Cooper discussed the 70 recent arrests in India relating to IRS phone scams, and Police Officer Atkin discussed the clown sightings/threats that the Nassau County Public Schools have been hearing about via Instagram. A disruption by older kids on bikes at Bunky Reed Park during soccer practices was also discussed. Gang workshops were requested, and some other incidents, including suspicious males in Manhasset, an overdose death, and mini bikes and dirt bikes at W.T. Clarke High School and at the Salisbury Center, were also mentioned. All issues with regard to the police department were addressed as appropriate to the satisfaction of the attendees.

October 17, 2016 at 1400 Hours: Hampton Street School, Mineola

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin

A lockdown drill was performed. Police Officer Atkin walked the hallways with the principal. There was a lockout after the debriefing. The clown issue and Instagram photos were also discussed.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 17, 2016 at 1930 Hours: Flower Hill Board & Administration, Manhasset

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

The Village of Flower Hill Trustees passed a law turning Sunnyvale Road into a one-way street during designated dates and hours to ease traffic caused by cars stopping to see holiday lights. It will become a one-way street from Nov. 25 to Jan. 19, between the hours of 6 pm and 11 pm for north bound traffic only. The board also passed laws suspending parking on Sunnyvale Road, Wood Valley Road and Cherrywood Road and prohibiting right turns when traveling north at the intersection of Wood Valley Road during the same hours. The residents wanted to know how the new ordinances would be enforced. The POP unit/patrol will enforce the new ordinances. Residents also asked about enforcing a noise ordinance, which states that there should be no loud music or noise after 11 pm. Residents were told to call if there is a constant, loud noise that is unacceptable before those hours and the officer responding will assess whether the noise is reasonable or not. The homeowner will be cited if there is a clear violation.

October 17, 2016 at 2000 Hours: Village of East Williston, Village Hall

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

Police Officer Atkin reviewed an East Williston robbery case from September and then he introduced nextdoor.com, a social networking site that can be used to connect whole communities. Officer Atkin said the Third Precinct would begin sending messages out via nextdoor.com after the official roll out in the coming weeks. He reminded attendees that it will be getting darker earlier and random timers for interior lights would be a good idea.

October 18, 2016 at 1100 Hours: Searingtown Elementary School

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin

Officer Atkin reviewed the new BOCES protocols during the safety meeting. A lockdown drill was conducted. A debriefing took place after the lockdown to address any issues encountered during the drill.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 20, 2016 at 1900 Hours: Village of Mineola, North Shore Islamic Center, Chaminade High School, Mineola High School Auditorium

Department Members in Attendance: Inspector John F. Berry, Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

The Third Precinct Community Forum for the middle zone included a power point presentation by Inspector Berry of the precincts borders, posts and crime statistics. Officer Atkin spoke about Nextdoor.com, which is a social networking site that can be used to notify homeowners of break-ins in the area, as well as other things and the Nassau County Explorer Program. Officer Cooper spoke about POP, and the difference between POP and regular patrol and phone scams.

The mayor of Mineola mentioned some people are hesitant to call if they see suspicious activity because they don't want to take an officer away from patrol when there are more serious calls. Officer Atkin explained how calls are put into a cue, based on priority. An East Williston resident expressed concern over traffic conditions on Hillside Avenue near the train tracks. The resident is interested in getting a crosswalk between Bengyfield Drive and Post Road so children can cross safely into Devlin Park. The resident was told that he may submit a request to the precinct or through the school district for a crossing and the precinct would conduct a survey. Officer Cooper said he would contact Nassau Traffic to survey the area for a possible crosswalk.

October 22, 2016 at 0900 Hours: Village of Williston Park, Village Hall

Department Members in Attendance: Sergeant Marie Posey, Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

Police Officer Atkin reviewed the crime statistics for Williston Park and the combined statistics for Williston Park and East Williston. He then discussed "target-hardening" their homes and reminded residents to lock their car doors. Officer Cooper spoke about phone scams (including recent arrests in India and prevention). Officer Atkin briefly discussed nextdoor.com, which is a social networking site that can be used to notify homeowners of break-ins in the area, as well as other things. Handouts were distributed to attendees.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 24, 2016 at 1400 Hours: Levittown School District, Levittown Memorial Education Center

Department Member in Attendance: Deputy Inspector John Johnsen

A school district safety meeting was held following a school lockdown after three males with guns were observed exiting a vehicle near an elementary school. The subjects were located and the guns were determined to be paintball guns. It was emphasized that the school should determine the level of emergency response (lockdown versus lockout) based on the information communicated by the police.

October 24, 2016 at 1930 Hours: North Shore High School, Glen Head

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

The school's Parent Teacher Organization (PTO) noted that the Glen Head school district has had 15 overdoses (opiates/heroin) year to date. Topics discussed included drug trends in the community, local statistics of drug and alcohol related incidents, legal consequences of substance abuse, medical research of the brain of teenage marijuana users, the Social Host Law and the responsibilities of the homeowner (accountability and consequences) of violating the law. POP gave a presentation and the assistant district attorney spoke as well. POP offered to assist the school, parents and PTO leaders in contacting the Manhasset Coalition Against Substance Abuse (CASA) to empower and educate the community as a whole and to heighten awareness. In addition, POP spoke with numerous community members for possible drug sales and consumption information, which is forthcoming from the residents. POP will conference with Inspector Berry to coordinate efforts in the area. The ADA also talked about a facility in Freeport, New Hope, as a resource for teens and young adults with opiate and heroin dependency. She mentioned additional upcoming initiatives to aid the public also.

October 25, 2016 at 1830 Hours: STRIVE Program, Searingtown Elementary School

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin

Officer Atkin explained the REACH program and how it could benefit the parents of the STRIVE program. REACH provides important information to law enforcement so they can find an individual with a cognitive disorder who is missing quickly. He then discussed "Smart911" and Project Lifesaver.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 26, 2016 at 1030 Hours: AARP-Mineola Chapter, Village Hall

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

The functions of POP were explained by officer Atkin. He then discussed how to “target harden” a home and spoke about phone scams, specifically in reference to the IRS. Distraction scams and solicitors were also discussed. He spoke about when to call 911 versus the POP office, versus the Third Precinct desk. Officer Atkin discussed Smart911 and brochures were distributed on all of the topics that were discussed. In regard to whether or not a field worker is legitimate, attendees were told to call the company to see if the worker was scheduled to go to their home and to check to see if they have photo identification with the company logo on it.

October 26, 2016 at 1100 Hours: Roslyn School District, Roslyn Heights

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

An administrator for the school district requested a report for a petit larceny of a stolen Hosta plant on August 9th from the Roslyn School District grounds. The school administrator, along with the school administration, terminated an employee based on video evidence of her committing the petit larceny. The school is being sued civilly by the former employee and requested a meeting to discuss the report and civil liability. In addition, the administrator requested a copy of the written 32b and case report in its entirety. POP Officer Rivera met with the administrator and provided her with the victim’s copy of the case report. The report was reviewed and she was informed that when the case for petit larceny was taken and the detective followed up, there was no request for arrest. She was also informed that it is a civil matter and if she needed additional documentation, I would need to speak to the Legal Bureau, which I did. He said that since the school district is considered a governmental agency, and the former employee was acting on its behalf, I could release the case report and narrative to her without a FOIL request.



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Third Precinct - Quarter 4

October 26, 2016 at 1400 Hours: Resident, Village of Flower Hill

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

The resident requested a follow up to the October 17th meeting regarding traffic and parking conditions on his street for his holiday display. He stated that he was not able to attend the October 17th meeting and had concerns. First, he requested that the parking restrictions be lifted so that people can stop and enjoy his light show. Secondly, he said that the right turn from Wood Valley onto Port Washington Boulevard posted a hazard due to the option for drivers to make a left turn, which is a blind turn. POP addressed the safety issue with regard to the potential for drivers making the left from Wood Valley onto the blind turn. After driving the route, the POP Officer agreed with the complainant that drivers should be re-routed. The village administrator said he would go to the board and speak to them about the parking restrictions. The POP Officer said he would like to see how the traffic is at peak time and make any changes after ascertaining the traffic pattern. The complainant will ultimately need to work these issues out with the Incorporated Village of Flower Hill.

October 28, 2016 at 0900 Hours: St. Mary's Elementary School, Manhasset

Department Member in Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

The meeting was called due to New York State required lockdown drills, which must be performed four times per school calendar year. The school requested assistance from the POP Unit in performing the drills and assessing the effectiveness of a mock situation. The school received guidelines for an effective lockdown/lockout procedure. The emergency preparedness processes were reviewed and suggestions were made to improve them.

November 1, 2016 at 1000 Hours: Feinstein Institute of Research/Adolescent Drug Abuse, Roslyn Heights

Department Member of Attendance: Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera

POP officer Rivera attended a presentation by Dr. Stephen Dewey, which focused on adolescent drug using a variety of substances, some of which were illegal. The studies were eye opening, so Dr. Dewey will present at the next POP meeting. It would benefit the POP officers in their duties and they would have a better understanding of the clinical side to addiction as a result of seeing the presentation.

November 3, 2016 at 0930 Hours: District Wide Safety Meeting, Carle Place High School

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

Updates about the schools buildings were given by the director of facilities. Construction is nearly complete at all of the district's schools. Lockdown drills, which were said to be largely successful, were also discussed. There was some concern about the public address system (if it stopped working) and the administrators had to manually unlock all of the classroom doors. Future meeting dates were also discussed.

November 3, 2016 at 1900 Hours: Lakeville Estates, Town of North Hempstead, Project Independence, Clinton G. Martin Park Meeting Hall

Department Members in Attendance: Inspector John F. Berry, Police Officer Todd Atkin and Police Officer Jesse Cooper

The Third Precinct community forum for the West Zone included a power point presentation of the precinct borders, posts and crime statistics. Officer Atkin spoke about Nextdoor.com and the Nassau County Explorers Program. Officer Cooper discussed the difference between POP and regular patrol. He also talked about phone scams and some key POP projects in the zone.

The Lakeville Estates president inquired about receiving real time information on major issues going on within the precinct so he can inform his constituents. The inspector explained that the New York Statewide Police Information Network (NYSPIN) is used to distribute necessary information quickly. He also explained that under normal circumstances, it is not practical to disseminate information in real time as police activities are unfolding. An issue with commercial overnight parking in New Hyde Park, as well as criminal activity at LA Fitness, was also discussed. The Nassau County Federation of Republican Women presented Police Officer Moy with a Lifetime Achievement Award. He gave a brief speech of gratitude. The republican candidates gave speeches and POP contact information was left for any future concerns.

November 4, 2016 at 1300 Hours: North Shore Schools, Glen Head

The assistant principal asked if he could post information on the school's website regarding The Anonymous Drug Analysis Program. POP forwarded him a press release regarding the program and guided the school on how to go about turning in found narcotics. POP also informed the school that each precinct and police center has a drop off prescription drug receptacle to dispose of unwanted prescription drugs, with the exception of creams, gels and liquid prescriptions.

CASA discussed new strategies for combating underage drinking and substance abuse. The police received pertinent information about ongoing conditions. POP contact information was left for any future concerns.

November 15, 2016 at 0900 Hours: St. Mary's Elementary School, Manhasset

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Christian Moy, Police Officer Carlos J. Rivera and Police Officer George Iwasiuk

A meeting was called regarding the state required lockdown drills, which must be performed four times per school calendar year. The school requested POP's assistance in assessing the effectiveness of the drill in a mock situation. A mock lockdown drill was performed, and the administrative staff had numerous questions regarding the drill. POP also reviewed the school's emergency preparedness procedures and made suggestions for future drills.

The school conducted an active shooter drill to satisfactory standards. The officers made a few suggestions for future drills. POP contact information was left for any future concerns.

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FOURTH PRECINCT POP SUCCESS STORY

Several complaints were received from residents, commuters and pedestrians in the Lido Beach area concerning aggressive speed violations on Lido Boulevard. Residents requested enforcement of violations and the possible addition of speed bumps.

First, POP officers visually observed the traffic flow in the area and witnessed numerous vehicle and traffic law (VTL) infractions. After conferring with the Highway Departments of both Nassau County and the Town of Hempstead, it was concluded that speed bumps were not an option that would solve the problem or increase safety. POP officers also decided that enforcement should include post cars as well, due to the large number of violations witnessed and the long length of Lido Boulevard. Chief of Patrol authorized the use of Nassau County Police Department's community oriented police enforcement (COPE), Highway, and critical incident rapid response team (CIRRT) units to assist POP with enforcement.

During the months of October and November, a planned, concentrated effort was implemented. It included the scheduling of the various units during the observed "spikes" in time where traffic infractions were the most frequent. The idea was to continuously "flood" the area with police presence and provide heavy enforcement of any and all violations.

The team effort resulted in a total of 740 summonses issued on Lido Boulevard. Since the completion of this effort, the Fourth Precinct has not received any more complaints regarding traffic violations on the boulevard.

Residents have complained about a parking issue related to pickups after school hours. POP met with the principal to see if a solution could be found. All issues with regard to the police department were addressed as appropriate and to the satisfaction of the audience and the requesters.

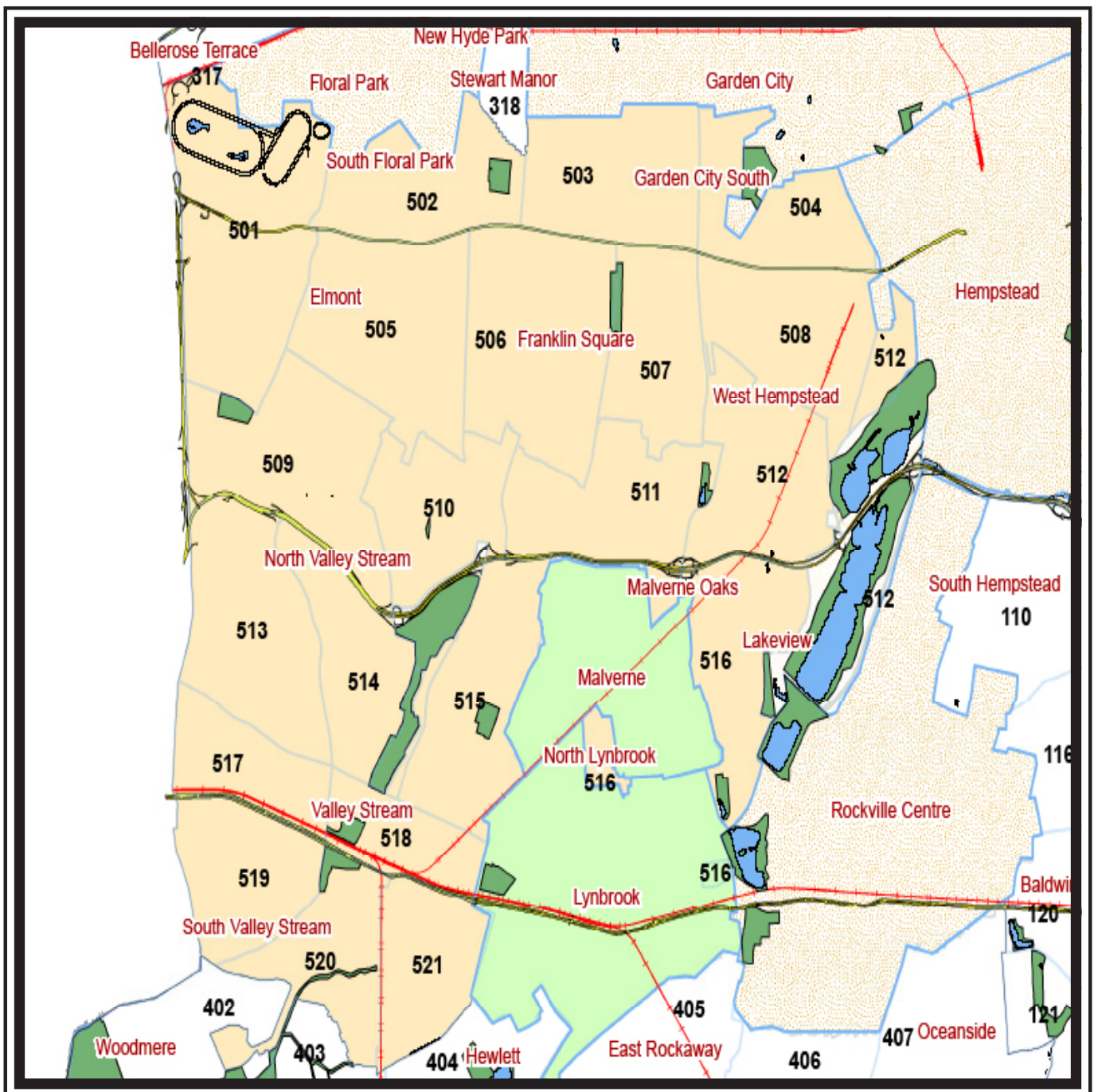


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Quarterly Community Policing Report



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FIFTH PRECINCT POP SUCCESS STORY

POP received several quality of life related complaints from civic association leaders and residents about a local business located in West Hempstead. Supervisors at the Fifth received the complaints and notified the POP office.

There was a homeless woman living in the parking lot and there were tractor trailers parked illegally on Bond Street.

POP identified the problems and how they were impacting the public and the police department. The tractor trailers were impeding the vision of motorists attempting to exit or enter the parking lots on either side of Broad St. The tractor trailers were making the area, which was perpendicular to a townhouse complex, resemble a commercial parking lot. Some of the trailers were parked illegally on a Town of Hempstead street in violation. The safety of the homeless woman (both mental and physical health) was considered. She was on private property with a vehicle that was not operational and it was unregistered and uninsured. Officers visited the location several times – at different times during the day and night and observed violations. There was tractor trailers parked there. The homeless woman's vehicle was always parked there, but she was not always physically present. The owner of the private property was identified.

The parked trailers were researched to determine what period of time certain trailers were parked there, the history of the tractor trailers via the New York State Police Information Network (NYSPIN) to locate the owners, and why the current response to the trailers (summons) was not effective in solving this problem.

Once identified, the property owner became involved and engaged in the problem. The homeless person was confronted, identified and engaged for assessment purposes. The property owner offered the homeless person financial assistance to get her vehicle running and lodging so she would have a place to stay while repairs were being made to the vehicle. She was non-compliant and did not recognize the property as private – she thought it was fine to live in a public parking lot. Mobile Crisis was contacted and they came to the location for an evaluation. The homeless person was deemed in need of psychological assistance, and she was transported as an aided case to the Nassau University Medical Center (NUMC). The vehicle was then removed by the property owner via a private towing company. The tractor trailer owner with the most offenses was identified as an independent trucker who lived in



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the Village of Hempstead. The trailers he was using weren't registered to him or his company, which is why ticketing these vehicles was not a deterrent. The Nassau County Traffic & Parking Violations Bureau was contacted to see if booting was an option (unfortunately boots in their inventory will not fit on a trailer). The independent trucker and trailer owners (when identified) were notified. There were dozens of summonses issued. One impound via the Town of Hempstead (TOH) was executed (most of the time trailers were removed before the TOH was able to hire a contractor to remove them).

When the homeless person was released from the hospital, assistance was provided for her to get her vehicle out of the impound and get the mechanical repairs the car needed. To date, the homeless person has not returned to the area.

After one successful impound, the volume of illegally parked trailers at this location declined significantly. Monitoring the situation and enforcing laws pertaining to the tractor trailers via weekly visits by POP officers to the area and post car patrols, proved to be effective steps in rectifying the situation.

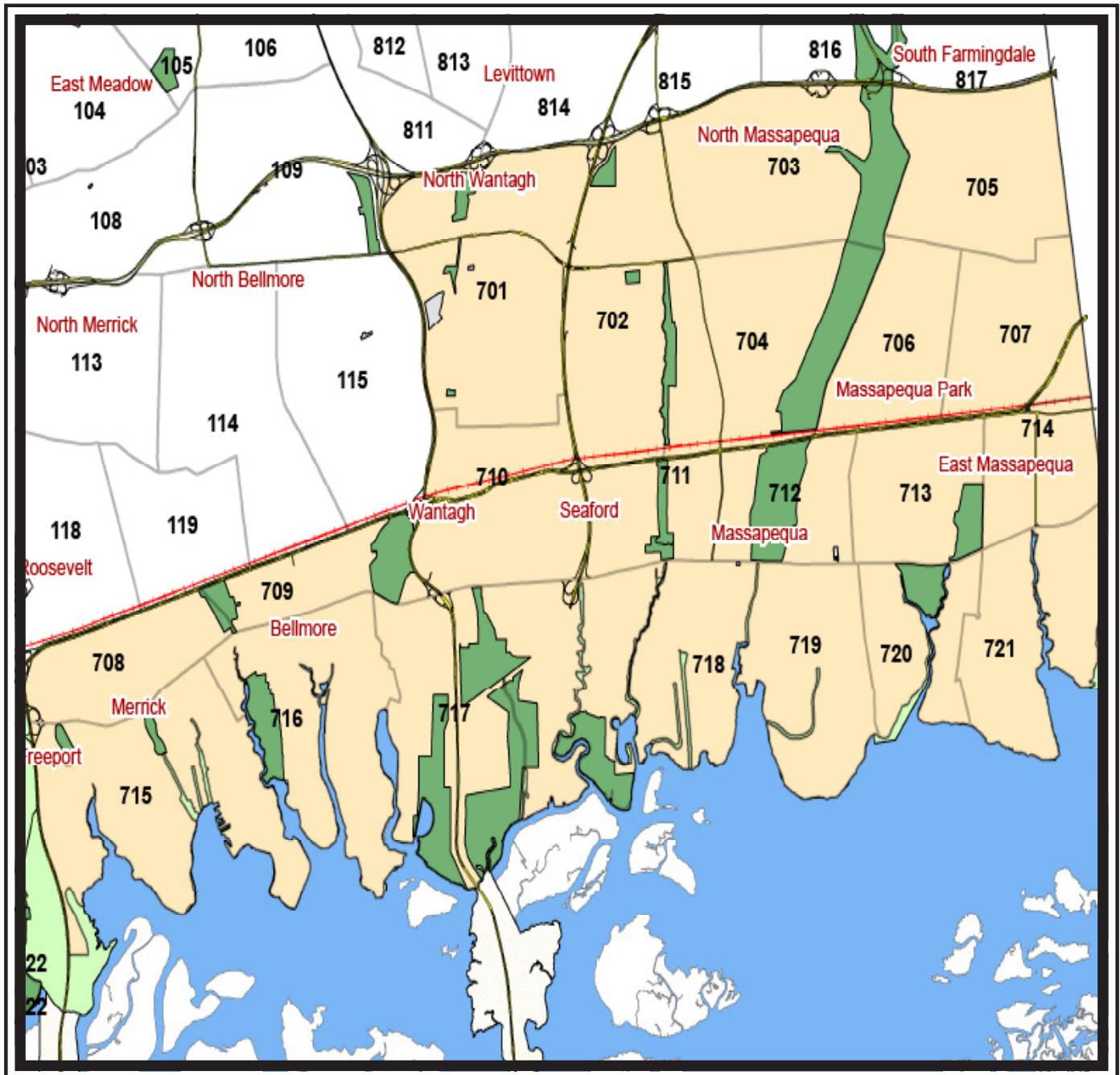

SEVENTH PRECINCT POP SUCCESS STORY

Neighbors saw activity at a vacant house in Merrick in July 2015 and they assumed the house had been sold. Instead, they discovered that a squatter family had moved in. Shortly after, several 911 calls were received about the location. Patrol began referring any calls for this address to the POP unit after the unit was resurrected in December 2015. At first, it seemed the problem might not really be a POP issue or even a police matter at all, since patrol was successfully handling the chronic criminal complaints at the location, and there was no property owner complaining about squatters. POP officers attended a Bellmore-Merrick Civic Association meeting and decided that in order to tackle the criminal activity stemming from the home, POP would have to dig deeper to the root of the problem.

Through past records and several false leads, POP officers were able to finally locate the actual homeowner of the property, who had abandoned it. POP officers were able to convince the owner to attend the next civic association meeting to hear the current situation from the neighbors. He did not attend, but he promised to help POP help the neighbors.

POP officers educated the owner about the eviction process, which he promised to begin right away. Two weeks later, with relentless phone calls from us, he finally filed papers and began the formal eviction process. We kept in touch, and the owner, who initially wanted no part of the house, actually felt empowered and became emotionally invested in the fight. He kept us apprised of court dates and we believed the end was near. An eviction warrant could be only days away. Well, the owner went to court with victory on his mind, and low and behold, the squatter showed up with a lawyer! The lawyer filed an injunction against the owner for serving papers to his "client" that failed to show the owner's return address. Consequently, the judge threw the case out. The owner said the squatters won and they could keep the house. POP officers asked the owner to take a mental break until POP's "phase two" fight plan was in order.

By now, POP officers got to know all of the neighbors on a first name basis. The neighbors said the school was having behavioral issues with the squatter children. There were continued 911 calls for drug activity. Patrol continued to respond with arrests and reports, and the neighbors continued to complain about the upset of their once peaceful block.



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Phase two began. POP gathered all their resources and formulated a plan, attacking from all angles. The owner went back to eviction court to begin the process again. PSEG and the Town of Hempstead were contacted. With the owner's last engineering report, which included electrical wiring problems at the location, PSEG was able to shut the power off. The Town of Hempstead was quick to respond and deemed the house uninhabitable. The squatters were required to leave the premise due to safety concerns. The house was boarded up and "no trespass" signs were placed in front of the home. At this time, the house remains vacant. With 32bs secured from the homeowner, in addition to the no trespassing notices in place, the police now have the power to arrest anyone who enters the premise. The chronic 911 calls have stopped and the house is currently in negotiation for a tentative sale. POP officers have been inundated with thank you calls from the neighbors. They recognize our unmarked car and they thank us again each time we drive down the block as we continue to make sure the house is secure.

Approximately 75 protesters responded and picketed along with politicians in regard to an application for Billy Deans, a cabaret, to open at this location. A hearing is scheduled for October 13th. The protesters were kept on the sidewalk and the politicians set up a platform across from Route 27 so no laws would be violated. The opposing protesters were separated to maintain order.

October 5, 2016 at 0700 Hours: Seaford High School

In light of the recent media mania involving scary clown sightings across Long Island, with more specific reference to the Seaford schools, Inspector Barbieri initiated a discussion with school security to address the specific threats of the clowns at the school. The inspector appropriated POP and post cars to be present at the school for admission and dismissal to provide a police presence and dissuade any possible mischievous activities. There were no mischief incidents or clown sightings reported.

October 5, 2016 at 1445 Hours: Seaford Administrators, Seaford Middle School

The quarterly safety meeting included talk about media driven scary clowns. Participants toured the building in search of any safety or security issues, which will be addressed by the school. To date, lockdown drills have been successful.

A health aide reached out to the precinct to request a visit for her client, a 34-year-old male with Asperger's Syndrome, who has a strong affinity for all things police related and wished to visit a police station. He investigated the holding cell and the various offices within the building, and he was introduced to all members. He sat in a radio motorized patrol (RMP) car and manipulated the lights and sirens, which he stated was the highlight of his trip. He also received some fun handouts. It was a memorable experience for all those involved.

October 7, 2016 at 1400 Hours: Wantagh Resident

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Patricia McCaffrey and Police Officer William Taylor

A complainant reached out to POP officers regarding a quality of life issue – a large population of feral cats on her block, running in gardens, fighting and making a lot of noise at night. She conducted her own surveillance and discovered someone placing cat food along the fence of a local business. She provided registration information. Animal control has been active at this site in the past and was able to capture and neuter nine of the feral cats. POP officers ran the plate of the subject feeding the cats and visited his home. The officers explained to the complainant that he was creating a nuisance in the neighborhood. He was very cooperative and agreed to stop feeding the cats.

School administrators were concerned about the possibility of disturbances, which have plagued Massapequa High School and another Nassau County high school in prior years. POP assisted in the quick dismissal of all attendees and kept the opposing parties separate. There were no conflicts.

The manager of a business located within the mall met with department members regarding criminal activity – two stolen vehicles. The current level of security was discussed and suggestions were made to prevent future thefts. Clients were notified to use extra caution.

The Daisy Troop from the Abbott School visited the Seventh Precinct to learn about following rules and respecting authority. Inspector Barbieri greeted the troop and they made their way through an escorted tour of the police building. The participants earned a petal for the lessons they learned.

The councilwoman requested a conference to discuss the ongoing events of the squatter house on Kenny Avenue in Merrick, which has been a source of frequent and significant complaints from the residents of the block. POP officers have been working diligently with the homeowner to begin and continue an eviction process against the squatter, who showed up with a lawyer at court proceedings and was able to have the case against her thrown out on a paperwork technicality. In the interim, POP officers and the homeowner reached out to the TOH Building Dept. (see October 31st item) to describe the hazardous conditions posed by the electrical system in the vacant house. The house was boarded up and condemned. The problems have been resolved.

November 2, 2016 at 1400 Hours: Nassau County Legislature, Seventh Precinct Station House

Department Members in Attendance: Police Officer Patricia McCaffrey and Police Officer William Taylor

An issue was raised by the local legislator's office regarding the typical occupancy of the two motels within the confines of the Seventh Precinct. The legislator's office has addressed some issues in the past related to provisions of Section 8 Housing/permanent residency at both locations. The information wasn't shared with the NCPD since it is not a police or criminal matter. Information pertinent to the nature of the type of NCPD response to the two listed locations was shared in a general nature to provide background and insight to the residents of the community and how they can be affected. This was an information sharing session and it does not warrant further police action.
